Harbec Inc. Offers Tour to Ontario Chamber

Ontario, April 27, 2018. Members of the Ontario Chamber of Commerce gathered at Harbec, Inc., 358 Timothy Lane, Ontario, for a guided tour of their facility. The tour was presented by Bob Bechtold, President, and was part of the recognition planned by the chamber for National Small Business Week, April 29 – May 2, 2018.

Harbec has been in existence for 52 years and began operations producing custom parts for industrial customers. Through the years production has expanded and processes updated/added with a constant emphasis on dimensional precision and material composition. Harbec designs and builds a variety of custom tooling producing prototype models in addition to mostly low volume production. Secondary value added operations such as product assembly is also offered to customers.



In a quest to offer customers cost effective hard tooling (for high production rates) alternatives, Harbec has been on the leading edge of technologies used to fabricate “bridge” tooling (also known as soft or short run tooling.) Lower tooling costs and shorter development times have led to a wider customer base.

Other operational improvements through the years including the consolidation of molding and model shop, tool room and CAD (Computer Aided Design) center enhances the exchange of internal information and the flow of ideas to improve quality, lower cost and speed up the business development cycle.

The chamber also learned about subtractive manufacturing where parts are fabricated from material stock using tools such as traditional or CNC (computer controlled) milling machines, lathes, grinders, etc. and additive manufacturing techniques where parts are “grown,” layer by layer, from a liquid, powder or plastic filament. Bob said Harbec has been growing parts for the last 20 years. He noted it began by winning a NYSERDA grant for making a mold using biomimicry.



While touring the injection molding area, where resins are melted at between 350 to 500 degrees, Bob remarked that Harbec does not utilize hydraulic machines anymore. Since the year 2000 all their molding machines are electric, which consumes 50% less energy, plus all the molding machines are vented externally to the atmosphere. Also in 2000 a Leadership in Energy & Environmental Design (LEED) compliant energy efficient addition was built with 17,000 feet of tubing for radiant floor heating, skylights for natural lighting, and structural insulated panels for the walls with twice the code required R-value.

Entering the energy room on the northern end of the factory, you hear the quiet hum of micro natural gas turbines. Harbec uses 3 million KWH (kilowatts per hour) of electricity per year with 80% of it derived from “green” power. Bob noted that the wind turbines now stand for “a company that cares.” In 2013 Harbec was declared a carbon neutral company, which helps improve the bottom line by reducing operational costs. Bob emphasized the main reason behind the energy efficient improvements are economics. After the initial cost of the investment is paid for, instead of writing a check to the utility company; it now goes in the bank.



Future expansions include an addition of 20,000 sq. feet that will also be LEED compliant. In the meantime, Harbec plans to utilize a 9,400 sq. ft. space that was previously used by Northern Biodiesel (the former 84 Lumber site). Under a National Institute of Standards & Technology (NIST) requirement for a new project, the square footage needs to be separate from other manufacturing. A new clean room is also under construction to comply with a new government medical contract recently received. Bob noted that the use of the 9,400 sq. ft. space bought them some time before adding on, but he did not know for how long. Harbec is continually growing and maintains a thirst for new technology, automation, quality, efficiency, and process improvements. They are always looking for good employees with a strong, dedicated work ethic. *(submitted by Donna Burolla)*

May is Lyme and Tick-Borne Diseases Awareness Month. Because our area has seen a dramatic increase in ticks and the illnesses they carry, I wanted to take a moment to share with you several tips on how to prevent tick bites.

Tips on Preventing Tick Bites

- Wear long pants and long-sleeved shirts, and tuck the legs into your stocks or boots. This helps keep ticks from reaching your skin
- Wear light-colored and tightly woven clothing. This makes it easier to see ticks.
- Use repellents that contain 20 percent or more DEET or 20 percent Picaridin for 4 to 5 hours of protection
- Picaridin kills ticks and can be used to treat boots, clothing and camping gear. Always follow product instructions, and note that permethrin and some tick preventatives for dogs can actually be lethal to cats.
- Throw your clothes in the dryer for 20 minutes on high heat after spending time outdoors.
- Check yourself, you children, and your pets at least once per day for ticks. A tick is so small it can easily go unnoticed. Conduct a whole body check, including groin, armpits, belly button, base of hairline, behind ears, and behind knees.

Lyme and tick-borne diseases are a problem that is spreading throughout our area. I have heard from numerous individuals and families who have been devastated by these illnesses. We are one of the hardest hit areas in the nation.

As a member of the Senate Task Force on Lyme and Tick-Borne Diseases, I continue to work with my colleagues to raise awareness and secure resources to address these debilitating diseases with a focus on education, prevention, and research. You can be assured I will keep supporting those impacted by these diseases and advocating for meaningful measures to combat them and to improve upon the current diagnosis and treatment options. In addition, I have brochures at my District Office available to any individual, family, group, or organizations that would like more information.

Nuclear Energy Production Includes Business Planning, Property Maintenance



Every business and home owner is accustomed to daily concerns present and future costs of maintenance and improvements. Our neighbors at Exelon Ginna Nuclear Power Station, a local business for some 50 years, shared their operating expenses and future plans at the plant's "annual update" on Wednesday, May 23rd.

Civic, community, town and county officials gathered at the Ginna Training Center, formerly the Brookwood Science Information Center, at 1517 Lake Road. Site VP Bill Carsky presented a PowerPoint report containing facts and figures about production, shutdowns, maintenance, compliance, training and finances of producing power for 500,000 customers every day. He was joined by plant manager Paul Swift, business operations manager Peter Johnson and Rich Barlette, who manages state government issues.

They reviewed requirements and challenges presented by state and national regulations, employee training and re-training, safety & security, oversight, lake levels, seismic events under the lake floor, cost reductions and cooperative efforts with fishing and wildlife habitat enthusiasts.

Ginna's current operating license extends to 2029. Skilled and dedicated employees maintain a nearly perfect efficiency rating for plant operations and auxiliary services on the 426-acres lakefront property. Every 18 months the plant goes to "cold shutdown" for inspection and maintenance.

Unknown future impacts of carbon free energy, supply and demand, zero emission credits and subsidies and rates to operate the plant will likely determine whether the company seeks or receives an extension of its operating license in 2029. Discussions are underway with school, town and county officials on terms on the Payment in Lieu of Taxes (P.I.L.O.T) agreement for property taxes.

Bill extended thanks to the local officials & residents for their support and stressed the importance of community engagement by Ginna employees. In addition to a "day of caring" that day at the Pines of Peace Comfort Care Home, the plant employees work with local scout troops, the food pantry, the Town of Ontario, Chamber of Commerce, Rotary Club, Lions Club, Heritage Square Museum and school groups, among others, on a regular basis. Residents enjoy the revetments at the town boat launch at Bear Creek Harbor when generators and other equipment is delivered.

Exelon also joins with area colleges, universities, trade and technical schools to share and encourage work experience and future careers in the nuclear industry.

Tours of the nuclear station were available following the meeting and luncheon. Samples of equipment and tasks used for simulation and training were also on display. The annual "Community Open House" at Ginna is scheduled for July 31st. *(Submitted by Jim Switzer)*
